Comments from previous participants




Learning as students did in the 19th century, the students listen to a story and recall information from McGuffey's Readers, participate in a spelling bee, identify common classroom items from that era, play on stilts, and write with chalk on slates. Students are mesmerized by tales of life in earlier times, and they note the differences between a rural one room school of yesteryear and their 21st century classrooms. The one-room schoolhouse brings history to life for children and gives them an experience, not just a lecture. They get to touch, taste, smell, and feel a part of history. The experience can give them a new appreciation for the "luxuries" of life we now enjoy every day.

Programs

School Days* - This half-day program is tailored for fourth graders from area schools. Students experience what school was like for children in the 1890's. Home Life* - This half-day program is highly interactive and hands-on. Students will learn what home life was like before and after school. Using authentic tools, students will participate in the 'chores' of this era, as well as partake in games and family activities.
